To Fight Monsters

When Steven Moffat took over as head writer and executive producer of the long-running British Sci-Fi franchise *Doctor Who*, he was asked if he believed fairy tales still had power.

Do fairy tales still have power? Well, look at the movies that have been made. Yes they do.

But when I say "fairy tale," a better way of saying it would be "modern fairy tale." It's not that [Doctor Who is] like the old fairy tales, or that it resembles them, it's the modern equivalent. It's the way we teach our children that there are things in the world that might want to eat them. [Doctor Who] just feels like a fairy tale: A man who fights monsters but never becomes one.

(From Charlie Jane Anders iO9 interview of Steven Moffat on 5/18/10)

We have our fair share of monsters in our lives, or at least monstrous behavior. I don't believe anyone is truly a monster, because we are all made in the image of God, but monstrous actions, choices, beliefs, and desires are all around us. We may not run from Weeping Angels, Daleks, goblins, trolls, or white walkers, but we have to live in fear of the neighbor with a gun who has a grudge or sickness, the fanatic that has access to a hardware store to make a bomb, the misguided and selfish boys who would take advantage of a girl's temporary weakness, and the bullies who feel good about themselves when they can exert their power or dominance over another human. There are monsters. They don't live in the dark forest or in a world far away; they live down the street.

We need the stories of someone who fights the monsters, but never becomes one, because we are faced with that temptation every day. It is so easy to fight fire with fire. It is so tempting to demand an eye for an eye, a life for a life. But how can we rid the world of monsters if we are constantly transforming ourselves in their image?

I remember after the terrorist attacks of 9/11 how much I wanted to just march into Afghanistan or Iraq or anywhere really, and just blow things up. I wanted to cause someone the pain we as a nation were caused. I think many people felt that way. Toby Keith certainly expressed it in his song *Courtesy of the Red, White, and Blue*. Do you ever feel that way? After all these shootings and terrorist attacks, did a part of you want to cause that same kind of pain to the shooter? Has the monstrous ever come out in you in the presence of all these monstrous acts we endure week after week?

We need the great fairy tale: the great myth become fact. We need the Gospel. Jesus defeated the monsters in our life without becoming one. He stayed true to his identity in God. He loved. He had compassion, and suffered with us. He spoke the truth. He challenged the monsters without becoming monstrous. He didn't take on the form of power, or revenge, or pain. He didn't take the form of military might or monstrous fear. Instead, Jesus took the form of a servant. Jesus took and held the form of love and mercy and hope and in doing so transformed the monstrous cross into a place of grace. The cruciform way challenges the monstrous without living like monsters.

Today, the church is called to tell stories. We tell the stories of a man who fights the monstrous without become one. We tell the stories of a savior who is with us and for us. In the midst of all this pain and darkness and fear, we can tell stories. We can also live the stories we tell. That's the role of the church today. We are called to fight the monsters of fear, division, prejudice, violence, hate, and pain without becoming a monster in the process. We do that by following Jesus and his example. Perhaps we, too, through the power of Christ, can transform the monstrous into grace and love. That's our hope. That's our faith.

The Problem with Parables

We are studying the parables in the Gospel of Luke during the Thursday morning Bible Study. I thought that as we studied the parables and that I would open scholarly commentaries and we would understand "The Meaning" of the parable and we would all be smarter. James Whitehead says "Faith is the enduring ability to imagine life in a <u>certain</u> <u>way</u>." (my underline). I thought that the parables would point us to "that certain way."

There is a problem with parables. The problem is: there is not one meaning, one application, one way. The parables are fictional stories which are to awaken our imaginations to <u>new understanding</u>. But that is the problem; that by opening the door to imagination, the possibilities of its application is endless. Like this parable:

"No one tears a piece from a new garment and sews it on an old garment; otherwise the new will be torn, and the piece from the new will not match the old. And no one puts new wine into old wineskins; otherwise the new wine will burst the skins and will be spilled, and the skins will be destroyed. But new wine must be put into fresh wineskins. And no one after drinking old wine desires new wine, but says, 'The old is good.'" (Luke 5:36-39)

As anyone who heard this parable would know, a new piece of fabric will simply not work as a repair to an old because it will rip away. New wine cannot be in old wineskins because they would not have the elasticity to hold the fermenting expansion of the new wine. One application meaning is an answer to the question. "Why don't the disciples fast?" (Because don't fast and pray for Messiah to come, when Messiah is here.) Yet, its bigger than that. It also fits with John's description of being "born again of water and the Spirit," and Paul's statement that we are "New creations in Christ, the old has gone." The applications for new to replace old seems to be endless.

So, I continue to be haunted by this parable. Lord, what am I trying to patch? Where am I trying to put old into new? How are you calling to me to surrender the old and put on the new? It is leading me in a new way of seeing-- "a way of living—that requires a certain loosening of the grip, a willingness to be surprised, confused, amazed by the undreamt of ways that God chooses to be revealed to us." (Barbara Brown Taylor, The Preaching Life.)

Rev. Taylor also says "Wittingly or unwittingly, we human beings are driven by our images of ourselves, of other people, of God and the world—images that come to us both from within and without." We come by our images honestly. I hear on the news that another has taken the path of destroying another. Yet, another has seen some "unholy" other as the problem. Applying the principle of Parable: New images of self and others requires a surrendering of the old images of self and others.

So, perhaps it ties into another parable of trying to take the speck out of another's eye, when quite comically, I have a log in my own (Luke 6:41-42). You and I need to first admit where you and I are not loving our enemies. We need to examine where we too are acting first as judge of another. Identify where we are holding onto old images, instead of seeing others through the lens of love, God's love. Until we see ourselves as part of the human problem, and choose to surrender to the renewing of our minds (Romans 12:2) we cannot begin to envision a solution. The unrest in our world today is challenging you and I to <u>NEW</u> ways of loving, because the evidence of old patterns of thinking, now emerging into the light, are not working. The old ways are not holding the love patch, and cannot hold the new wine of love according to the greatest commandments.

The parables: they are a problem. A problem because they open all kinds of possibilities, including how we are to become new in how we love one another.

May the Grace and Peace of Christ be the lamp to our path in all ways, Patricia

You may have seen on the news or online about the new phenomenon that is Pokemon GO. "This church is always doing great stuff around town- like the Peace for Peoria events that they are involved in."

"Thank you so much for this. I walked around your church's lovely grounds today, admiring the flowers and greenspace."

We also received this letter:

To everyone that helped organize the pavilion, snacks and drinks. I would like to say thank you so much! I have been running all around town chasing fictional monsters and this is the only place to offer refreshments free of charge. I have been by your church at odd times of night, during the day and in the evening and it is a real hotspot that almost always has someone playing this silly little game. I am looking forward to coming by and catching 'em all at your church. Bless you.

New Advent Wreath Being Made

UPC is in need of a new Advent wreath this is big enough to fit in the space of our large sanctuary. Our own master woodworker Jim Pugh has volunteered to make us a beautiful new large wreath on a stand. It will match the rest of the wood in our sanctuary and elements of it will tie in with the features of our pulpit and baptismal font.

Since our new wreath will be much larger, we will need new oil candles for the wreath. We'll need four blue candles and one large white Christ candle. These candles are expensive but will last for the next twenty years. This is an unbudgeted expense, but one that will help us have a beautiful hand-made unique Advent wreath for generations to come. The total cost of the wreath and candles will be about \$1000, which is much cheaper than buying a wreath of this size. Support Local Artists in Upcoming Event

Peoria has an arts scene that is picking up in momentum. There are galleries and studios popping up downtown. First Friday's has become an accessible and fun way to meet artists and enjoy viewing their work, and new artists are emerging. However, there seems to be a gap between emerging artists and available platforms to show their work.

A local artist and I met for coffee one day to discuss this. We decided that we wanted to form a community of artists and patrons of the arts designed to create a shared network for artists as well as advocate for ways to support emerging artists in Peoria. A few months ago we had our first meeting, and it was so encouraging. We had about 15 artists attend from around the community and they were able to share their concerns, dreams, and ideas about how Peoria and the church can become better supporters of artists who haven't "made it" yet on the arts scene.

Health and Wellness

Eating a Rainbow

During VBS, the Health and Wellness team spent an evening talking about nutrition. We challenged the kids to "Eat a Rainbow". We talked about foods that were naturally colored all the colors in the rainbow and then played a game that combined strawberries, orange juice, bananas, spinach and blueberries to make a "rainbow smoothie". 95% of the kids gave the rainbow smoothie two thumbs up, and over half the kids asked for seconds!

Why is 'eating a rainbow' important? Fruits and vegetables get their color from naturally occurring micronutrients— such as vitamins and phytonutrients—which are extremely important for good health. These vitamins and phytonutrients include beta-carotene, lutein, lycopene, and vitamins A, C and E. Eating a colorful range of foods (or eating a rainbow) helps you get them all naturally in your diet.

Stumped on how to "eat a rainbow" beyond smoothies like the VBS kids made? The following are a few ideas to get you started:

- Make a tropical rainbow fruit salad with fruits of each color: oranges, pink grapefruit, mango, papaya, kiwifruit, bananas, and purple grapes.
- Sauté your own medley of mixed vegetables using each color: red onions, carrots, corn, jicama, broccoli, and black beans.
- Try a spinach salad with dried cranberries, canned mandarin oranges and red onion with your favorite vinaigrette.
- Make fruit-sicles: Puree your favorite fruit such as melon, peaches, banana, and/or berries with 100% fruit juice. Freeze in ice cube trays or paper cups or popsicle molds for a refreshing treat. Use fresh, frozen or canned.
- Make a dried fruit and nut mix for snacks. Include dried apples, apricots, cranberries, peaches, pears, cherries and mixed nuts.
- Pizza for breakfast? Top a toasted English muffin with tomato sauce, a scrambled egg and fresh spinach. Add grated mozzarella and melt.

Pastor Stephen will give you a tutorial on the system and there are instructions and guides in a notebook. If you're interested in making this part of your ministry to your neighbors, please talk with Pastor Stephen.

Last fall around 40 members of the congregation packed the library as we discussed how to respond to the Syrian refugee crisis. The group felt an immediate financial response was war-

ranted through our "Lifelines to Syria" campaign to assist those

living in refugee camps. But the group felt strongly that an additional long term component was needed and we felt called to provide support and form a personal relationship with a family relocating to our community. For many months the Mission Committee has been searching and praying for this missing piece and asking for God to guide us in our efforts. We are excited to announce a partnership with Northminster Presbyterian to assist in relocating a refugee family to the Peoria area through World Relief. We will be a community guide and friend as they adjust to their new life in America. There are many ways you can help in this endeavor from donating items for their home, welcoming the family as they arrive at the airport, providing transportation to medical appointments, serving as an ESL tutor, or answering their questions about living in Peoria. The Mission committee will be providing more details about specific needs as well as the training hosted by World Relief for interested volunteers.
